3. Jesus tells us clearly to not judge. What do you think He is prohibiting and how does the context of the passage help us?

4. What is the danger of judging according to verse 1? Who will be judged by, and how impactful could that judgement be?

5. Jesus says that "the way" in which we judge is the standard by which we are judged. List some of the ways we can judge inappropriately. Which of these (Surface, Hypocritical, Unforgiving, etc.) poses a problem for you? Why?

6. How does the presumption that we are sufficient to judge others place us in a very dangerous position with God? What exactly are we presuming when we leave His standard of judgement and insert our own?

7. The focus of Christ's illustration of the speck and the log is to make us see how our hypocritical judgment is revealed. How is it that we can find fault so easily and be so blind to our own? 8. How does hypocritical judgement endanger us and make us useless as brothers and sisters in Christ?
